Remits wording should be to the point with sufficient background provided by the remit sponsor. Attendees will have their opportunity to speak for or against a remit. The remit sponsor shall have 2 minutes to speak, with a supporter and opposer also having 2 minutes. Additional supporters and opposers may be called by the session chairperson but their speaking slot is limited to 1 minute. Background	Objective: Empower citizens and NZ First's credibility through binding statutory referendums and accessible public participation platforms – as based on Sweden's Governance model. Key features: Organize mandatory, binding referendums on critical issues. Example genetic technology, personal health, exiting the UN; W.H.O all subject to a national interest test Development of digital platforms for public consultation to influence policy and legislation Impact: These reforms will ensure major decisions reflect public views will enhance democratic legitimacy and participation. Sweden's governance model praised by the OECD for its independent administrative bodies, ensures public trust through institutional autonomy. Legal independence: separating legal and political powers enhances the credibility of legal institutions and aligns with democratic principles. An independent Attorney General would align with global best practices for separating legal and political powers.
